To the members of the Transportation Safety Advisory Committee,

I am writing this letter to appeal the decision of the City of Moose Jaw to deny a pedestrian safety crossing at the Iron Bridge residential area and Thatcher Drive. I understand that a low volume of pedestrian traffic was a reason for this decision; however I would like to acknowledge that many children do not use this intersection (by foot or on bike) because of their parent's concerns for their safety in crossing Thatcher Drive, hence the low pedestrian count. This intersection is avoided by our smallest residents skewing the data.

After speaking with Steven Loptson in July, he indicated that I send a letter to appeal the decision to deny the request for a safe crossing from our neighborhood and, in addition, a petition from residents in the community. He stated that the residents should be 60 m of my home, 131 Iron Bridge Drive. An expanded petition has been attached to this letter, and signed by residents in the community (residents within 60 m of my home are noted on the petition).

Your consideration of this appeal is appreciated by the residents of Iron Bridge Estates. Every home in Iron Bridge is represented on the petition with 100% of the resident's being IN SUPPORT of a pedestrian crossing with overhead lights at our neighborhood intersection and Thatcher Drive. We are hoping for a format similar to the lights/crossing as presently installed at the West Park residential area and Thatcher Drive.

Thatcher Drive is a very busy street with an increased speed limit and a high volume of large trucks. This poses a threat to the residents of Iron Bridge Estates, with our highest concern being for our children. Thank you for your consideration.

This is a public document.

1. Enhanced Traffic Control

During the April 19, 2017 Committee meeting and subsequent May 8, 2017 meeting of City Council, the report dated February 15, 2017 from the Engineering Department to the Committee indicated that upon application of the proposed traffic warrant system, the following process would occur to address a citizen's request for enhanced traffic control:

- Upon the receipt of a written request for the installation and/or removal of an enhanced traffic control, the applicant will be informed that a petition, favourably signed by at least sixty percent (60%) of the residents within ninety (90) metres of the subject intersection, must be submitted;
- 2. Upon receipt of this petition, the City's Director of Engineering Services or his/her delegate will inspect the site and in conjunction with the traffic and pedestrian warrants laid out in the Bylaw will make a recommendation on the proposed installation:
- 3. City Administration will report to the Transportation Services Advisory Committee on a quarterly basis with a list of requests and recommendations;
- Should the request be supported by the Transportation Services Advisory Committee, said Committee will make a recommendation to City Council that a bylaw be prepared for the enhanced traffic control, to which approval will be requested;
- 5. City Administration will contact the applicant in writing of City Council's decision.

It should be noted that to permit an enforceable enhanced traffic control that falls outside the warrant system, a bylaw will need to be prepared and passed. As the traffic warrant system will be incorporated in the Bylaw should the Bylaw be passed, a resolution of Council cannot overrule the Bylaw. Instead, a bylaw will need to be prepared.

Good morning,

May I please request that this e-mail be forwarded to the City of Moose Jaw Transportation Services Advisory Committee.

I am composing this e-mail at the request of many concerned Faculty, staff and students at Saskatchewan Polytechnic – Moose Jaw Campus.

At present, the speed limit around Saskatchewan Polytechnic, on Saskatchewan St., McDonald St., Algoma Ave and 7th Avenue is 50 km/Hr.

Each day there are a large number of students crossing these roadways. We have had several complaints of near misses between the students and passing motorists. In addition the Security staff have reported a number of passing motorists who's speed appeared well above the posted 50 km/hr limit.

As this is an educational institution with up to 1800 students, may I please request consideration be given to the fore mentioned streets being designated as a school zone and the speed limit thus lowered to 40 km/hr.

The city of Saskatoon has done this on 33rd Street and Idlywyld Dr. North which is the busiest street adjacent to the Saskatchewan Polytechnic-Saskatoon Campus. They also have established traffic lights with a pedestrian walk button and photo radar box.

Your time and attention to this matter is greatly appreciated.

Dear Mr. Allen and the members of the Transportation Services Advisory Committee,

The Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery attracts over 30,000 visitors per year. In addition to this, over 4,000 students of various ages attend educational programming and over 3,500 people attend ParkArt (our annual fundraiser) in each year. This means, of course, that there is a large volume of pedestrian traffic in the area surrounding the Library and the Gallery.

Throughout the years, we have heard the testimony of many people who have expressed serious concerns about the safety of the area running from the intersection where Athabasca meets Langdon Crescent to the crosswalk where Athabasca St E. meets 1st Avenue N.E. Several times we have heard stories of near-misses and other threatening situations stemming from the traffic flow of that area. As you likely know, in November of 2015, one the Moose Jaw Public Library staff was hit by a bus while crossing the street at Athabasca St. E. and 1st Avenue N.E. This incident, of course, demonstrates the seriousness of the situation.

I am requesting that this area be assessed for safety and that measures and implementations be taken to increase the safety of our patrons and the city's citizens in this area. This will only serve to enhance the experiences of people as they seek to enjoy Crescent Park, the Moose Jaw Museum & Art Gallery and the Moose Jaw Public Library.

I am writing in regards to, what we believe to be a safety concern at both the Athabasca St. E. and Langdon Cres. crosswalk, as well as the cross walk at Athabasca St. E. and 1st Ave NE. We have over 100 staff, students and children crossing at both of these crosswalks 5 days a week and at various times throughout the day all of whom feel that they need to be extra diligent while crossing. We do not feel that the cross walks are marked well enough and site lines may be an issue in the matter of the 1st and Athabasca. crossing.


While there have not been any incidents for us to report there have been many near misses; vehicles just seem to fly through both of these intersections oblivious to the fact that there are 2 crosswalks located less than half a block from each other. There have also been concerns voiced over vehicles turning east onto Athabasca from Langdon Cres. as they come off the curve at the yield sign and not paying attention to both pedestrians and other vehicles heading east on Athabasca (I've personally been cut off there more times than I can count).

This is a high pedestrian and vehicle traffic area and we are requesting that a study or assessment of the aforementioned intersections be completed and recommendations from the assessment be implemented to increase traffic safety in this area.

Dear Mr. Allen and the members of the Transportation Services Advisory Committee,

As you may know the Library is quite a busy place with 170, 395 visits from people of all ages in 2018 alone. In addition to the Library, there is a lot of pedestrian traffic in the area around the Library to the Art Museum and even simply to Crescent Park. At the Library we are committed to make this a safe and welcoming space for community members and visitors.

In November of 2015 one the Moose Jaw Public Library staff was hit by a bus while crossing the street at Athabasca and 1st ave N. E. In the time since that event, many staff members have voiced their concern over the safety of the intersection, reporting many near misses. Our staff are concerned not only for themselves but for the diverse range of patrons that use the library, frequent our programs and rent the facility. The concerns were brought to the Library Board who supported the writing of this letter.

I am requesting that the crosswalk area where Athabasca meets Langdon Crescent to the crosswalk at Athabasca and 1st Ave N.E be assessed for safety, and measures investigated and implemented to increase the safety of those areas.

Downtown is a wonderful area for pedestrians to enjoy Moose Jaw. I believe that the experience can be improved by increasing the safety of traffic in the area.
